
he Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship is an international organization that provides safety and best practice guidelines to accredited centers like Reins of Life. The PATH Int'l comprises 11 regions. Region 4 is made up of Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, and Ontario equine-assisted service centers and members. The dedication and the talent of the humans and horses at Reins of Life are award-winning, and PATH Intl Region 4 agrees. 2023 Volunteer of the Year was awarded to Kyle Minnick of the Michigan City Barn and 2023 Horse of the Year was awarded to 'Fancy Fay' (pictured above).

Kyle Minnick began volunteering in 2019 and now helps in a variety of programs including therapeutic riding, interactive vaulting, therapeutic driving, and school groups. Additionally, he has volunteered to lead a teen work group doing facility projects and volunteers as a horse feeder on a regular basis. It has been an amazing experience to witness this teen develop over the last few years. The maturity and leadership that he shows are just part of what makes him a true gem.


'Fancy Fay' is a 14.2 Hand Haflinger Mare. Reins of Life was able to purchase 'Fancy Fay' in 2018 through an awarded grant from the Michigan City Community Enrichment Corporation. Fay (for short) takes part in therapeutic carriage driving, therapeutic riding, and school programs at the Michigan City Barn. She has also been a partner to students competing in Carriage Driving and Benefit Dressage Shows. An ROL parent says it best, "At first, my daughter was somewhat nervous and unsure about trying carriage driving, but because this horse has such a great temperament, is always calm, and is always ready to work, she quickly overcame her uncertainty. Since my daughter began this program, I have seen her self esteem improve and she has become more self-confident in her daily activities. I believe this is due in large part to this program and her horse."

Kyle and Fay's regional awards have been submitted to PATH Intl. for consideration for the international award, announced Summer 2023.

A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Reins of Life promotes an inclusive environment for people from all walks of life, ages, and abilities. We offer multiple mounted and unmounted programs to address the specific needs of our communities. We continue to remove barriers, and improve current or create new programs. Just a couple of months ago, we installed SureHands, a mechanical lift, to transfer participants out of wheelchairs for lessons at one of our two centers.

After two years of the pandemic and dealing with its imposed limitations, we noted a growth of almost 40%. We enrolled over 630 individuals in onsite programming with multiple candidates on the waiting list. We accepted riders as young as two years old, with the oldest participant being 78 years old.

We registered 114 unique diagnoses, which fall into physical, cognitive, emotional, and social categories. In most cases, participants had multiple diagnoses. The most frequently recorded were: Autism Spectrum Disorder, ADHD, Anxiety, and Cerebral

Reins of Life, at its core, uplifts the human spirit. It brings people together by honoring all walks of life, forms of learning, and means of connecting with one another.

REMEMBERING A FOUNDING MOTHER & HER LEGACY



Almost 34 years ago, Reins of Life posted an ad in a local paper requesting volunteer help with hauling horses to their therapeutic horseback riding program. Nancy Taylor responded. That was the beginning of a long and productive partnership. Nancy, 91, passed away Feb 27 at her beloved home on the hill overlooking Reins with her children surrounding her. Nancy leaves her three children, Steve, David, and Kathy, as well as 6 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren. She was preceded in death by Lloyd, her husband of 57 years. Nancy was a force to be reckoned with. After hauling horses and volunteering in classes for several years, she recognized the need for a forever home for Reins. In 1991, she and Lloyd donated 20 acres of their Lydick farm for that purpose. No task was too big or small for Nancy to undertake. Pastures were fenced and standing sheds were built to accommodate the horses. On days when the weather was too bad for volunteer feeders to come out, Nancy would trudge down to feed and care for the horses. Manual labor was not beneath her as she, Lloyd, and Lydick's neighbors toiled to complete the construction of the barn and stalls. Then Nancy put on her fundraising face and acquired much of the funding to complete the facilities. Most recently, she donated 10 additional wooded acres that are used as sensory riding trails, and are now known as Nancy's Trails. From that inauspicious beginning of hauling horses and mucking stalls, Nancy was instrumental in developing the Taylor Center, the heart of Reins of Life today. Nancy became a member of the Board of Directors in 1990, on which she remained until 2019 when health issues intervened. She held positions as Board President, Vice President, and Secretary for several years. Her voice was always heard and respected reflecting her many years of experience seeing Reins through both good and difficult years. She continued volunteering well into her 80s taking on any task asked of her, from baking her famous chocolate cherry cake for various events to writing thank you cards to attending the Kelsey Marie Meekhof Benefit Dinner and other fundraisers. When you throw a pebble into a pond, the ripples spread out to the edges of the water. Nancy was that pebble. The ripple effect of her single-minded dedication and devotion will be felt for many years to come benefiting an untold number of people. She is greatly missed.
